3,4-MDMA	Also known as MDMA or Ecstasy, a recreational drug.	Yes
3,4-MDPV	A synthetic stimulant substance. Found in bath salt products.	Yes
4-hydroxymethamphetamine	A metabolite of MDMA, the active ingredient in Ecstasy.	Yes
4-hydroxyxylazine	A veterinary sedative compound.	No
6-acetylmorphine	A metabolite of heroin, an illicit opioid.	Yes
Alpha-PPV	A synthetic cathinone compound.	Yes
Alprazolam	An anxiety medication, commonly known as Xanax.	Yes
Amphetamine	A type of stimulant drug. Affects chemicals in the brain and nerves that contribute to hyperactivity and impulse control	Yes
Benzoylcegonine	A metabolite of cocaine, formed when the body breaks down cocaine, indicating recent cocaine use.	Yes
Buprenorphine	An opioid medication used for pain management and addiction treatment.	Yes
Bupropion	An antidepressant medication, also known as Wellbutrin.	Yes
Caffeine	A stimulant found in coffee, tea, and energy drinks.	Yes
